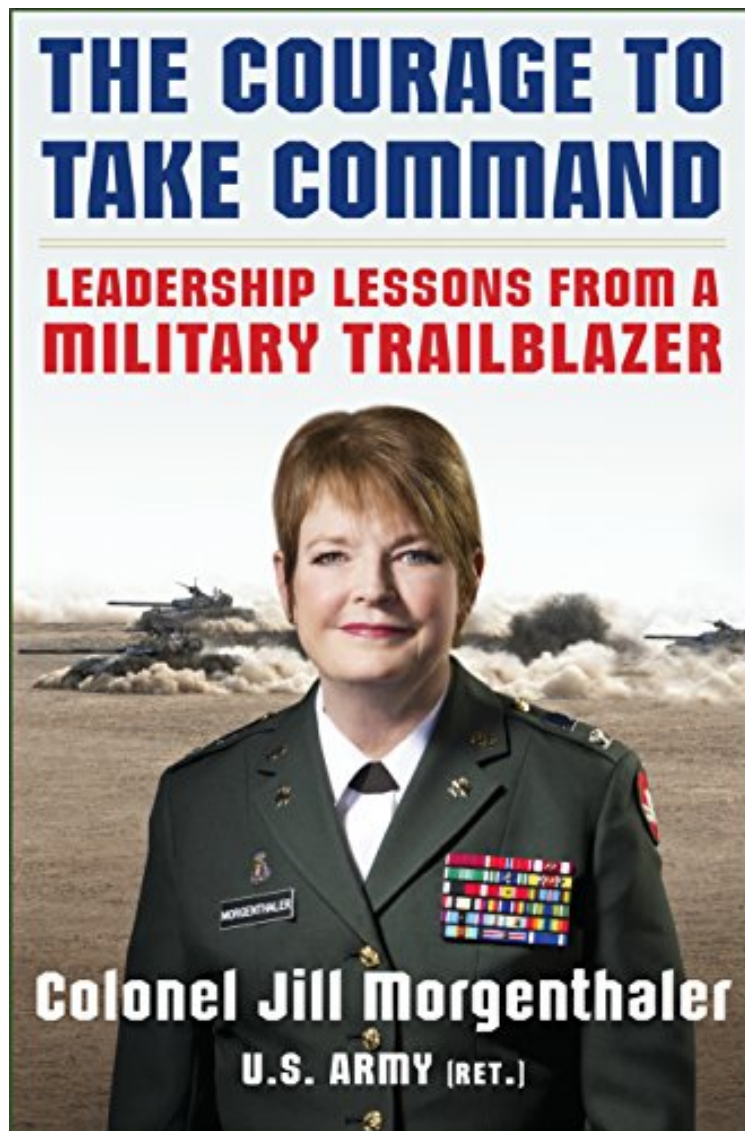

Fear never goes away completely, but you can learn to channel fear as a motivation instead of an excuse for inaction." "Organizational awareness. Cultivate relationships with power players.
